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3 ways to deal with oppression	
<p>1. Acquiescence</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">➤ Get used to the abuse or slavery (conditioned)➤ Give up➤ Oppressed become as evil as the oppressor➤ Oppressed are cooperating with evil➤ Easier but NOT moral➤ Way of the coward	<p>2. Violence</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">➤ Temporary - Solves no problems➤ Creates new problems➤ Impractical➤ Immoral➤ Violence ends by defeating itself➤ Violence is not the way
<p>3. Non-violent resistance</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">➤ Not physically violent➤ Evil must be resisted➤ courageous➤ Mass (large)➤ Militant (organized/disciplined)➤ elicits sympathy and help➤ Others will join your cause
